Trinity Lutheran Church Announces Cornerstone Celebration

A century ago, people gathered at the corner of George and Sherman streets in West Chicago, to set a cornerstone in place. A new brick church was to be built, replacing the earlier wooden structure. Since 1884, the congregation of Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church (Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, LCMS) have received the gifts of God through His Word and Sacraments on this site. The cornerstone laid on that day in 1923 was for a new and more substantial place to worship. That "new" building has stood the test of time and continues to be a place of worship, fellowship and service.



Recognizing that Christ is the True Cornerstone of His Church, and in honor and celebration of the blessings received over the years, the congregation of Trinity will be celebrating a century of worship in this building.

The beginning of September brings with it many things. It brings the excitement of heading back to school and the excitement of change. September means the end of summer, but also the beginning of a new season.

This September brings something else here at Trinity. It brings the recognition of 100 years of worship in this building. Our Cornerstone Celebration kicks off this month with a pie and ice cream social. You will see additional information elsewhere in this month's Tidings.

The most important aspect of this celebration, of course, is Jesus, our true Cornerstone. It is He alone who is worthy of our praise and celebration. Still, He has blessed us with this place to gather as His Church to receive His gifts.

This idea of having a "place" to properly worship the Lord goes a long way back. Far more than just 100 years. In fact, we see this all the way back to the time of Moses and the Exodus.

You see, the story of the Exodus begins with Moses asking Pharaoh to let the Israelites go in order that they may "...go a three days' journey into the wilderness that we may sacrifice to the Lord our God" (Exodus 5:3). Moses asks that the enslaved Israelites be given an opportunity to worship their God in their own place—a place set apart from the idolatry of the Egyptians. Later, as the Israelites traveled, Moses would set up a tent outside the camp, known as the Tent of Meeting. This was the place where Moses would meet with the Lord (Exodus 33:7–10).

This Tent of Meeting, under the direction of the Lord Himself, would then become the Tabernacle, the place

where the Lord would make Himself present and where His people could worship. From the tabernacle came the temple, the center of worship for generations.

During the Old Testament times, the place where the presence of God dwelt was in the Holy of Holies, an area of the temple divided from the people by a large curtain. With the birth of Jesus, the presence of God among His people was now in Christ Himself! At the time of His atoning death on the cross—at the moment when the sin of the world was paid for in full—the curtain of the temple was torn apart. Access to God was now available to mankind through Jesus! There was no more need for all the sacrifices that once took place because Jesushad made the ultimate sacrifice.

During the early years of the Church, Christians would meet in various homes for their place to worship. As a majority of these people came from a Jewish background, their style of worship was modeled after the worship order of the tabernacle and the temple—an order directed by the Lord Himself. Like the Israelites, these early Christians were under duress and persecution and desired a place of their own, where they could properly worship their Savior.

From the house churches, to stand alone buildings, to cathedrals to wooden or brick buildings, having a place to gather around the gifts of God—His Word and His Sacraments—is something to be thankful for. And so, over the next few months we will be doing just that, giving thanks for "our place."

It is important though, to remember that God's Church is not simply a building! It is more! It is the fellowship of believers. It is you and the person sitting next to, in front of, or behind you! The congregation of Trinity West Chicago is much more than the property on the corner of George and Sherman streets. Even if this brick building collapsed into a pile of rubble, Trinity would remain standing as long as we, the fellowship of believers remain standing on our only true Cornerstone, Jesus Christ. It is the confession of Jesus as Lord and Savior—as the Son of God who takes away the sin of the world—that makes the Church!

100 years ago, September 1923, this congregation had a lot going on! They were busy with building plans, budgets and business. More importantly, they were busy with the proclamation and distribution of God's holy Word.

Today, September 2023, this same congregation has a lot going on too. We are still busy with buildings, budgets and business. Most importantly, we are busy with the proclamation and distribution of God's holy Word. While technology and times have changed, His Truth never will!

Thanks be to God, that we have a wonderful place where He meets us and gets His work done.

Stewardship in the First Commandment

The greatest gift that Martin Luther gave to us was his Small Catechism. The word "enchiridion" is part of the original title of this work. This is the Greek word for "handbook." The Small Catechism is a handbook of the Bible. All the basic knowledge that a Christian needs to understand the faith and live a godly life has been taken from the Bible and distilled into this beautiful little book of Christian piety.

Luther starts with the Ten Commandments.

The First Commandment:

You shall have no other gods.

What does this mean? We should fear, love, and trust in God above all things. (SC I)

We have a God above us. He is the Lord God and we are not. He is Almighty and in control. He is righteous and good. And therefore, we should fear Him.

This God is also our heavenly Father. He wants us to be saved. He does not want us to suffer His just wrath. He has provided salvation for us in His Son, Jesus Christ. And therefore, we should love Him.

Our heavenly Father will never leave us nor forsake us. He has promised as much — and the Bible shows us that He always keeps His promises. So, we should trust Him.

In the Large Catechism, Luther explains how money and possessions form one of the greatest temptations against the First Commandment:

This I must unfold somewhat more plainly, that it may be understood and perceived by ordinary examples of the contrary. Many a one thinks that he has God and everything in abundance when he has money and possessions; he trusts in them and boasts of them with such firmness and assurance as to care for no one. Lo, such a man also has a god, Mammon by name, i.e., money and possessions, on which he sets all his heart, and which is also the most common idol on earth. He who has money and possessions feels secure, and is joyful and undismayed as though he were sitting in the midst of Paradise. On the other hand, he who has none doubts and is despondent, as though he knew of no God. For very few are to be found who are of good cheer, and who neither mourn nor complain if they have not Mammon. This [care and desire for money] sticks and clings to our nature, even to the grave. (LC I 5–9)

These words of Dr. Luther should call us to repentance; sometimes, we live and act like we don't have a Father in heaven. We seek our comfort and peace outside of His gracious promises. But we do have a Father in heaven. He does love us. All His promises are true. And the Lord will surely provide. If that is our belief, then our outward lives will reflect our belief in our acts of generosity and mercy. We will see money and possessions not as gods but rather as tools for doing God's work.

Remembering the Importance of Prayer

This is a story about termites. I'd prepared that week's volunteer team to be flexible, not for an infestation.

Yet, I woke up Saturday morning to 2 WhatsApp messages:

[10:39 PM] are you still awake? / [10:41 PM] we have been invaded by termites

No, I was not awake; I missed all the excitement. What ensued was a massive emergency extermination effort. Despite the meticulously crafted props, the team's skit for escuelita at Iglesia Luterana Pueblo Nuevo was the furthest thing from their minds, but I headed to the church anyway.

This is also a story about prayer. Minutes into the opening, sweet, 8 yr. old Josué raised his hand: "We haven't prayed yet." We had, in fact, not. A local deaconess rectified the misstep right away, but not before Josué had taught everyone gathered a powerful lesson.

Had I prayed yet? Do I regularly pause amidst my morning routine to lay my burdens before my Heavenly Father? Luther is famously quoted as saying, "I have so much to do today that I shall spend the first three hours in prayer." Let's face it: my life and yours are busy. We've all been infiltrated not with an army of miniscule six-legged enemies but with sin, death, and Satan. And yet, "everything...is made holy by the word of God and prayer," (1 Timothy 4:4-5). There is power in commending our days and actions to the One who created us and the time we inhabit. Entrusted into God's almighty hands, our lives glorify Him every step of the way.

Josué and company missed out on what I'm sure was an Oscar-nominated drama but nonetheless learned about Jesus. They sang, colored, had a snack, and went home. I met up with my team for lunch, but before we dug in...we bowed our heads and prayed.


